## Moving in

EVER since the death in May, 1968, of Mr. Parsons Wright, his home, The Manor, Wold Newton, has not had a regular denizen.

But now, London stockbroker Mr. Martin Ollard, son of the late Mr. Christopher Ollard, one time clerk to the magistrates of the Caistor Court, who also lived in Wold Newton, is to make it his home.

The house is remarkable in that it is not only as it was built externally, but that its furnishings have not changed one jot. It was built in the Tuscan "railway station" style, about the middle of the last century, its gently sloping roof equipped with generous overhanging eaves beneath which the swallows find a refuge.

The eminently rescuable gardens are somewhat overfurnished with massive chunks of ecclesiastical masonry collected from here and there by Parsons Wright's antiquarian brother, William. Some of the pieces are slabs of Louth Abbey, and the remainder no doubt catalogued somewhere or other, all relate to Lincolnshire church buildings.
